Master's in Counseling: Specialization in Rehabilitation Counseling Program

Mission Statement

The mission of Adler's Rehabilitation Counseling program is to educate students in the profession of rehabilitation counseling, with a focus on the provision of services that enhance the independence and quality of life for persons with disabilities. Special emphasis is placed on training students to become socially responsible practitioners who embrace diversity perspectives and who empower individuals with disabilities to build bridges across social, economic, cultural, racial, and political systems. The program will foster the development of social equality, justice, and respect for individuals with disabilities in the global community.

Diversity/Disability: Our program has a desire to attract students of underrepresented populations and students with disabilities; typically, 40% or more of our students identify as members of one of these groups. Currently 50% of our students identify as members of one of these groups.

Number of Graduates 2018: 4

Pass Rates of Credentialing Exams:

Program students are eligible to take the Certified Rehabilitation Counseling Examination, which is the precursor to obtaining certification as a rehabilitation counselor; 2018 program graduates had a 100% pass rate. The Commission on Rehabilitation Counselor Certification reports the following pass rates for all first-time exam candidates: March 2018 exam, 59% pass rate; July 2018 exam, 63% pass rate.

Completion Rates:

Incoming cohort AY 16/17: 80% completion rate
Incoming cohort AY 15/16: 82% completion rate

Average Time for Program Completion:

Students who attend full time can complete the program in two years; most of our students choose this option. A part time option is available; this allows students to complete the program in three years.

Job Placement Rates:

One hundred percent of Adler 2018 rehabilitation counseling graduates are employed in full time positions, in addition, some have also elected to pursue doctoral studies.
