### **Grocery Shopping**

It is strongly suggested that individuals should shop as infrequently as possible and at off-peak hours to practice social distancing. Stores including Whole Foods, Target, Mariano's and Walmart are creating special hours for seniors and vulnerable populations. You may also want to check with elderly neighbors to see if you can shop for them.

#### **Dedicated Shopping Hours for Seniors**

- Whole Foods: Customers age 60 and older can shop Fridays 7-8 a.m.
- <u>Target</u>: The first hour of shopping each Tuesday is reserved for the elderly and other vulnerable populations, such as those with compromised immune systems.
- <u>Mariano's</u>: The grocer has set aside two hours daily 6 to 8 a.m. for seniors and those with underlying health conditions. Call locations before going as the time may be different for each store.
- <u>Walmart</u>: Customers ages 60 and older can shop every Tuesday an hour before stores open. Walmart pharmacies and vision centers will also be open during this time.
- <u>Pete's Fresh Market</u>: Senior priority shopping hours are in effect 7-8 a.m. Monday thru Friday.
- <u>Meals on Wheels</u> is another program supporting homebound seniors, and they are continuing to operate.

### **Government Services**

<u>Pandemic EBT (PEBT)</u>: A temporary food assistance program set up to pay families for the value of the free or reduced-price meals their children were receiving at school.

<u>Chicago Public Schools</u>: Families can pick up free food boxes at any CPS school. Boxes contain three days worth of breakfast and lunch for every student in the household. Food-pick up is held outdoors. If you need assistance: call 773-553-KIDS (5437) or email familyservices@cps.edu.

<u>Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program</u> (SNAP) - The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) (formerly Food Stamps) helps low-income people and families buy the food they need for good health.

### Healthcare

<u>Howard Brown Health</u> offers discounted medical care, psychiatry, dentistry, and mental health counseling to patients who are uninsured and have low income.

<u>Chicago Community Health Centers</u> - If you do not have a medical provider, are uninsured, or have limited or no income and believe you need non-emergency medical services, you can contact your nearest community health center (CHC) by phone and inform them of your need. They will work with you to coordinate appropriate care. CHCs receive funding from the federal government that allows them to charge each patient on a sliding scale fee based on the patient's income and ability to pay. No patient will be turned away because of inability to pay. There are approximately 165 CHCs throughout the city of Chicago. You can find your nearest CHC at *findahealthcenter.hrsa.gov*.

# **Tuition Assistance**

- <u>MyScholly</u> Scholarship app which offers students the opportunity to apply for cash relief assistance of \$1,000 to be used on debt, tuition, groceries, transportation or other necessities.
  - Eligible individuals may also enter by mail without opening a savings account. Enter by mail: Hand-print your name, address, city, state, ZIP code, e-mail address (if available) and daytime phone number (including area code) on a 3" x 5" card, and mail in a business-size (#10) envelope with proper postage affixed to: 958 N. Western Ave #764 Hollywood CA, 9002. Each entry must be mailed separately. To be eligible for the Entry Period, mail-in entries must be postmarked by April 4, 2021, and received by April 9, 2021.
